4	you so much. I have been technically challenged all day.
5	Thank you everyone, and welcome. Today is November 16,
6	2021. The time is now 6 p.m. Eastern Standard Time. And
7	we'd like to welcome you to the Baltimore City Affordable
8	Housing Trust Fund Commission. My name is Cindy Truitt.
9	I'm the Interim President of the Commission calling our
10	meeting to order. Miss Tisha Guthrie and I will be
11	co-chairing the meetings until which time there is a new
12	president and a new Commission selected.
13	So I'd like to move right into calling for
14	attendance. And then I'll be turning it over to Ms.
15	Guthrie. So when you hear your name, please respond
16	affirmatively if you're here.
17	Matt Hill.
18	COMMISSIONER HILL: Present.
19	INTERIM PRESIDENT TRUITT: Thank you.
20	Iletha Joynes.
21	COMMISSIONER JOYNES: Present.

1	INTERIM PRESIDENT TRUITT: Vernadine Kimball.
2	I know Vernadine's here. Ms. Kimball? I'm going to mark
3	her present because I know that she is here.
4	COMMISSIONER KIMBALL: (indiscernible)
5	INTERIM PRESIDENT TRUITT: Okay. Thanks Ms.
6	Kimball.
7	COMMISSIONER KIMBALL: Thank you.
8	INTERIM PRESIDENT TRUITT: Tisha Guthrie.
9	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Good evening. Present.

21	summary of the September meeting notes. And after which,

I invite the Commissioners to (indiscernible) approve the minutes.

COMMISSIONER JOYNES: Excuse me, Madam Chair.

If you don't mind, but before we go into adopting the agenda and approving the minutes, I wanted to make a motion to the Commission to make a small amendment to the agenda by placing the update around the nominations at the beginning of the department update. So basically, right after we approve the minutes and before Mr. Mobley goes into his financial update, (indiscernible) last month, I feel like we should -- it's really important for us to spotlight that topic for tonight's meeting.

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Okay. So you'd like to move the update for the nominations to the beginning of the meeting. Okay, do we have anyone to --

COMMISSIONER HILL: Second. Madam Chair, this is Matt Hill. I'll second the motion.

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Okay. We have Matt Hill as seconding the motion. All in favor?

COMMISSION MEMBERS: Aye.

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Any opposed? Okay. The

1	amendment has been adopted. We will be addressing the
2	nomination updates right after the approval of the
3	minutes.
4	So again, I'm just allowing time for the
5	Commissioners to review the summary of the minutes.
6	After such time, we will be motioning to adopt.
7	(Pause.)
8	COMMISSIONER JOYNES: I motion to approve the
9	minutes.
10	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Okay. Commissioner
11	Joynes has motioned to adopt the minutes. Do we have a
12	second?
13	COMMISSIONER HILL: Second.
14	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Okay. Matt Hill is
15	seconding the motion. All in favor?
16	COMMISSION MEMBERS: Aye.
17	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Any opposed? Any
18	abstentions? Okay. Thank you. The September minutes
19	have been adopted. And with the amendment made to the
20	agenda, the next item is nomination updates for the
21	Affordable Housing Trust Fund Commission.

1	COMMISSIONER EDWARDS: Stacy, you're muted.
2	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: We still can't hear you.
3	MS. FREED: (indiscernible)
4	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: I can't hear you. Can
5	others? I just heard you just very faintly.
6	MS. ESTRADA: You're very low.
7	MS. FREED: Is this better? Can you hear me
8	now?
9	COMMISSIONER EDWARDS: It's a little better.
10	It's still low, but it's better.
11	MS. FREED: Can you hear me now?
12	COMMISSIONER EDWARDS: Yes.
13	MS. FREED: (indiscernible) the third time's a
14	charm. Good evening, everyone. My name is Stacy Freed.
15	I'm with the Department of Housing and Community
16	Development, providing an update on the nomination of a
17	new Commission. It's our understanding that the Mayor's
18	Office is drafting nomination letters and they are going
19	through the Mayor's Office process for final review and
20	signature. We talked with the Mayor's Office today.
21	This is still a priority. They're making every effort to

get them out as soon as they can, of which will be followed by a City Council, a formal City Council nomination. And I'm happy to answer any questions that members may have.

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Thank you, Stacy. Are there any questions that we have for Ms. Freed?

So, Ms. Freed, as I understand it, we are still waiting for a slate of new nominations?

MS. FREED: That is correct.

Joynes. So I don't have a question, but according to the City Charter under Article 4, Section C, if the Mayor has yet to submit nominations within 120 days of the Commission vacancies, then the power of appointment shall rest and be held by the Board of the Commission to which the vacancy applies, and that the Board of Commissions shall certify the names to the City Council for confirmation. And so, what I would like to do, is make a motion that the following names be certified by the Commission to the City Council for confirmation. I'm sorry?

2	motioning to submit a slate of names?
3	COMMISSIONER JOYNES: That is correct. Yes.
4	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Okay. Do we have any
5	debate? Any
6	COMMISSIONER SNOW: Hi. This is Shannon Snow.
7	So I guess is that a slate that is going to be
8	presented and we can see tonight?
9	COMMISSIONER JOYNES: So, yeah. I do have a
LO	list of people to fill this slate that I can present now.
L1	COMMISSIONER SNOW: And so, just to clarify
L2	those, and since the Charter specifically outlines
L3	different categories of people, you have that tied in to
L 4	show how it's tying into the Charter?
L 5	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Yes. Yes. Commissioner
L 6	Snow, why don't we allow Commissioner Joynes to follow
L7	through with her motion and then there can be questions
L 8	asked. I think that should be probably the protocol
L 9	right now.
20	COMMISSIONER JOYNES: Okay. So you want me to
21	go right now, Commissioner Guthrie?

1	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Please. (indiscernible).
2	COMMISSIONER JOYNES: So there's a Danise
3	Jones-Dorsey, which will be which will fill the spot
4	of a member with experience in the fields of housing and
5	community development; Franklin McNeil, he's from PNC
6	Bank, which will be a member of the lending community
7	that has experience in community development and
8	affordable housing; of course, Alice Kennedy, as the
9	Baltimore City Housing Commissioner; myself, as a
10	resident who represents a renter, an extremely low income
11	renter; Commissioner Kimball, who's a resident who owns
12	their home that has an extremely low income; Marian
13	Massenberg (phonetic), as a homeowner who receives
14	assistance through an affordable housing and home
15	ownership program; Commissioner Guthrie, as a resident
16	who received rental assistance; Mary Swiker (phonetic),
17	from Project PLASE, who is a social service provider;
18	Anthony Williams, as a representative of the Homeless
19	Services Board; Commissioner Hill, as a low-income
20	housing and inferior housing advocate; Minister Glen
21	Smith, with Coppin Heights CDC, as the nonprofit

1	affordable housing developer; Ernst Valery, as
2	representative of the home builders or relative
3	association, and lastly, Terrell Askew, as the member to
4	the Commission created by the Right to Counsel Ordinance.
5	So that's the slate that covers the different
6	categories.
7	COMMISSIONER HILL: This is Matt Hill. I'll
8	second the motion.
9	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Okay.
10	COMMISSIONER SNOW: So excuse me, Commissioner.
11	Commissioners, this is Shannon Snow. Since this is the
12	first time that I'm hearing anything about
13	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Sorry. Commissioner
14	Snow, can (indiscernible) just follow the protocol. Is
15	there any debate?
16	COMMISSIONER SNOW: Yeah. Hold on. Let me
17	mute this.
18	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: That's what I'm trying
19	to
20	COMMISSIONER SNOW: I just wanted to
21	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: (indiscernible) answer

the question.

2 COMMISSIONER SNOW: Yeah. I just wanted to 3 invite the Commission officially, (indiscernible)

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: So the Chair acknowledges Commissioner Snow.

as a Commissioner, this being the first time that I have heard of the motion, that we have this information be disseminated to us via email. We have time to consider it, think about it before we would vote at this meeting. So I would request that we table a vote and be considered, and then discuss, perhaps at a future meeting.

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Okay. Thank you,

Commissioner Snow. So we have a motion to table this

matter until a date to be set, hopefully, next month.

And we actually considered prior to the beginning of this

meeting, the December 14th date. This was mentioned by

Commissioner Kate Edwards and Commissioner Cindy Truitt.

So can we put both of those motions on the table?

COMMISSIONER EDWARDS: I hadn't proposed the

December 14th date. I think that was your proposal,

Commissioner --

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: -- it was mentioned.

Yes. Uh-hmm. We did mention that. I was just bringing that up. So both of those on the table as we speak.

So --

COMMISSIONER EDWARDS: So both of the motions

-- so the motion to table it to the next meeting and then
also a motion to have the next meeting on December 14th,
are those the two motions?

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Yes.

COMMISSIONER HILL: I think the motion to table the motion gets a vote first if I'm understanding right. And I'll second the motion to table the motion providing that we have a meeting December 14th, or if there's another date that works for others, we should come to that. But I'll second that motion.

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Okay. So all in favor of tabling this matter for a -- can be taken into consideration at a December meeting which we'll vote on in a minute.

1	COMMISSION MEMBER: Aye.
2	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: All in favor.
3	COMMISSION MEMBERS: Aye.
4	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Any opposed? Any
5	abstentions? Okay. So this matter will be tabled until
6	the next meeting. And it appears we have another motion
7	for the scheduling of a December meeting to take place
8	December 14th, which is Tuesday at 6 p.m. Any seconds?
9	COMMISSIONER JOYNES: I second that motion.
10	All in favor?
11	COMMISSION MEMBERS: Aye.
12	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Any opposition? Any
13	abstentions? Okay.
14	INTERIM PRESIDENT TRUITT: Ms. Guthrie.
15	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Yes.
16	INTERIM PRESIDENT TRUITT: This is Cindy. I'm
17	not sure if this is an appropriate time in the agenda. I
18	just wanted to ask a question. Now that there's a slate
19	that was proposed and the Mayor has a slate as well, I'm
20	unclear of the appropriate protocol that's to be followed
21	in the event that it's a dissimilar slate. I understand

the articles that you read, (indiscernible) I'm just -- I 1 2 don't know what the protocol is. Is that something that 3 should be discussed? Is it something that we should seek quidance on, or -- I'm in unfamiliar territory right now. 4 5 COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: So as I understand it, 6 this slate would need to be submitted to the Baltimore 7 City Council if there is -- I think, possibly Matt Hill 8 may have a little bit of --9 (Audio interruption) 10 COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: -- sorry -- as to the 11 next steps. But as Commissioner Snow indicated, this 12 list can be emailed to the Commission as was requested. 13 But as it's indicated by the Charter, this would have to 14 go to -- the next step would be submitting this slate to 15 the City Council for their review. 16 COMMISSIONER HILL: I say yes. We should take 17 up those questions when we reconvene December 14th. 18 COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: That's fine. Thank you, 19 Matt.

Commissioner Hill. (indiscernible)

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Okay. So the next agenda item, it is the Department updates.

MR. MOBLEY: Let's see. Can everybody hear me?

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Yes, thank you.

MR. MOBLEY: I was hoping everyone will see me in just a second. Oh, there we go. All right. Hello everybody. Welcome to another Commission meeting. It's good to see you all. We're going to talk about the September, we're going to talk about September 2021 financial data. Yes, I know it is November. But because we've moved the meeting up so close, I just got the expenditure data and haven't really had time to vet it because it takes time for the books to close, so bear with me. But we got the revenues, the tax revenue. So all the Commissioners have seen the tax revenue through October.

This is going to go give a picture through

September 30th of the year for the Affordable Housing

Trust Fund. All right. So, I'm going to go over the

budget. I'm going to go over revenue and expenditures.

We're going to talk about Community Land Trust and what's

all the exciting things that are happening there. We're going to talk about inclusionary housing and infrastructure NOFAs. And then we're going to talk about the Trust Fund orientation meeting. And we've already talked about the Commission nominations, et cetera, and what's going on with that. So we're not going to go over that part. So let's go ahead and get started.

So this is the beginning of the original projection that was made by the Department. With the (indiscernible) we had last year, we came up with a projection that we're going to get about \$8.6 million in tax revenue. On top of this \$8.6 million, we have a \$5 million City of Baltimore contribution that will be coming into the Affordable Housing Trust Fund. And with everything that we had, looking at the initial projections, we decided to go with the \$8.6 million number for our projection (indiscernible) budget to start our budget.

It turns out, we actually have been giving a little bit higher than what we've expected, which is a good problem to have. So as of right now, we're a little

bit ahead of our curve, and we're working through it.
Next slide, please.

So this is the way that things are currently set. To break down from what the original percentages were, going back for TFY '20 and '21, you can see the adjustments that have been made to each of the particular line items to see what's happening in, or what we expect budget line item-wise have been in just Year '22, which started July 1st and continues now to June 30th of next year. Next slide.

But right now, revenue collected to date just in Year '22, we collected, well, almost \$33.5 million. We have had \$7.6 million in this year. We are looking good. We are looking good. Now this does include the \$5 million contribution from the City of Baltimore (indiscernible), so this isn't just pre-tax revenue. Next slide, please.

All right. We can see the total breakdowns of how everything's going. We can see the tax revenue, and we can see the City of Baltimore contribution. If we look at it through September '21, this is what we've got:

\$5 million.

For example, of the City of Baltimore contribution, we have \$2.6 million of tax revenue that's coming in through September. Now, everybody I know is looking at this that's seen the October number is smiling right now. Yes, I realize that.

So the tech slides will actually be put on the website, and they are the following months. So these slides may get on to the website (indiscernible) is smiling right now. Everyone's smiling right now. I get it because who knows that next month, October, is a record month. It's (indiscernible) fantastic, so very excited about that. Next slide, please.

All right. We can see the breakdown now, see the percentages. This is your Baltimore contribution tax. Compare contribution revenue as opposed to tax revenue. Interesting split. The City of Baltimore had started out having a large share of the tax revenue.

Now, the tax revenue -- I mean, of the Affordable Housing Trust Fund. Now, the tax revenue is really starting to creep up, which is fantastic. This is a good place where

we want to be. But the year's not over yet. We have no idea what's going to happen, but it (indiscernible) at this point. So this is really good. The next slide, please.

All right. So for July, there were 18 transactions. In August, there were 29 transactions. In September, there were 21 transactions. Split. But the amount of recovered per transaction, if we were to average the amount, like, it seems a million dollars one way, \$63,000 in September, \$1.1 million in August, you can see that the averages of the transactions make it so that, even though there were less transactions in August, the numbers are pretty, pretty close. It's because there was a bigger chunk or average per transaction.

So we can see that the amount that we had -we're going to go ahead and go -- we get past this

October bit. If I'd had a couple more days, would've had

October and there would've been a lot more smiles and
that's good. But we don't have that right now. Next
slide, please.

All right. We've seen how it compares year

over year since FY getting the fiscal Year '20. In July, it started out a little rocky. August, all of a sudden it shoots up. September, we're up where we thought we would be in FY '20. So this is good. We are looking good, comparatively even. Next slide, please.

so if every month, we were expecting to get about \$717,000, that's fantastic. However, this month we got one point, you know, a little over \$1 million in this transaction. That's great. At this point in the year, we thought that we would have about \$2.1 million in the projection. Turns out, we've got 2.6. That's just the way that it is. Right now, we're ahead of the curve and this is just for September, not even we're going to move into October. Next slide, please.

All right. Well, here's something very interesting. Last year, the number of actual net expenditures over the last months, the number of net expenditures was smaller. Some of the transactions have actually been coming through. Some money is creeping out the door. We want this number to be a lot bigger, and we

are working to make sure that that happens. The commitments are so large and the revenue that we have in order to, like, make commitments, is growing. So this is good. We have money in order to make (indiscernible) and we're moving toward it. Next slide, please.

All right. So this is something new for us.

Put this one in, hopefully it'll help -- gave a slide
showing the actual awards that have been granted. And
commitments have been granted by the Affordable Housing
Trust Fund. And we can see in places, as a map, visual
representation as to where the projects are starting to
go. We can see the buildings. We can see the areas
where all of a sudden -- the pockets where our funds are
starting to make an impact in going into projects.

Whether it be commitment or actual dollars having moved,
we're working on seeing how exactly we're bringing to
play this to make it more fun and interactive for -- in
all interested parties. But that's a little something
that we're working on for later.

As of right now, that is a static bit where we can just kind of see on a map where the money is headed

to. Sides of the doc talks about how much money is going to one particular, like, unit, or structure, or address.

The (indiscernible) smaller dots -- smaller dollars. But you can start to see this is where it's going. All

right.

Next slide.

All right. So Community Land Trust, Single-Family Homeownership NOFA, No. 1, still doing deal structuring. There's lots of contracts that are being created in order to make sure that people who are ready are getting their money, getting the deal structured, making sure their financing is right. That way, we're able to take money and watch, make sure that the funds go out and get to the projects that (indiscernible) well, and are ready to break ground, getting it to -- the funds to them as the (indiscernible). We're making deals, trying to do our best to -- diligent -- I will say due diligence, but trying to see that it's doing the right thing.

Everyone knew people who have won awards.

Contracts are moving. They are seeing that it's happening. We're requesting more data, working with the

legal team, and it's happening. So -- and they're continually being pushed by our team out to the Board of Estimates for approval. It's happening in increasing volume. Next slide.

Family Homeownership NOFA, No. 2. This is the one that has just closed on the website. We had a NOFA posting date of September 1st. We had two pre-proposal conferences. We had the applications that were due on June 29th, which happened. We just closed. And originally, we had an award date, award announcement date of 1/25. I may have one from January 14th. And now, we're going to list the input of the Department. We're going to have the award update it's announcement on the week of January 25th.

I think originally there was a request to have the meeting for December skipped, and then there would be a meeting in January on the 25th. I'm not exactly sure what's happening with that, but whenever the January 25th, if we have one -- that meeting on January 25th, if we had won that meeting on January 25th, that's when I

announcement of who are the awardees for this particular member. When we figure out what exactly the newbie's going to be, I'll have a better idea about when the announcement's going to be made. But, we're assuming, like, around that week.

So we pushed it back a couple of weeks because of the holidays, and so that way, enough time to deliberate it. So, yep. So the NOFA's closed, applications are under review. We have panel members from the planning department, stability, project development, project finance. We're going to go -- we're going to have three meetings and are to discuss who of the seven applicants that applied, who is going to be receiving the funds. And we're working really hard with our consultant in order to do the best we can with the funds that are available. I look forward to this. All right. Next slide.

All right. So the inclusionary housing, the inclusionary housing still meets monthly, third Wednesday of the month. Please attend, so that way you can

understand what's going on. There's a website near the intake sheets. You just check in to it as your interest allows. Next slide.

New construction, preservation of existing rental housing, round one, we're still structuring deals for those who are available and ready to go around June. The contracts have been created. We're moving forward. Moving forward. So, next slide.

And now we're going to move on to the Affordable Housing Trust Fund orientation (indiscernible), which will be coming, I think there's a proposal that's supposed to have it on the 25th of '22. It'll talk about how exactly we get, how exactly we get commitments across the line and the process for that application goes through. I think someone else can discuss a little bit more about this, but that is the end, I believe, of the update for now.

COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: As always, thank you Mr. Mobley. I'm sure there are probably some questions, but I just wanted to thank you in advance for the presentation.

MOBLEY: I'm not exactly -- I'm not so sure 17 on that. 18 COMMISSIONER EDWARDS: It should have been. 19 Wasn't it part of the presentation, in as in the 20 presentation (indiscernible) posted? 21 MR. MOBLEY: Was not part of the presentation,

but I will get to it and make sure that it gets posted if it hasn't already.

then, kind of following up on that too, we had the smaller agenda setting Committee discuss an idea of having that flowchart being kind of the basis for plotting projects on the flowcharts so that we could understand how much progress those projects are making toward actual, you know, disbursement of the funds.

Because I think that, you know, some people could look at the amount of revenue and the amount of money that's in the Trust Fund, and say, well, wait a second, you know, you guys have been in operation for over two years and almost no money's gone out the door.

And so, I think it's important to address that issue and to show the progress that's being made in the all-over concrete way. So I don't know if the Department had any further thoughts on how we could operationalize that.

MR. MOBLEY: Well, there's been a couple of chinks that day at drafts. Like how to, like, show the

MR. MOBLEY: (indiscernible).

putting together that graph for us. And I think we're planning on incorporating that into the 25th meeting when we did this orientation. So the idea of the orientation was to really give the background and give the Commissioners more details. We were going to invite, actually, our partners with the MWBOO Office as well as the Law Department to present to the Commission -- talk about the process. It'll be a similar orientation that we would be giving the awardees. We did something like this for our community catalyst grants.

So that idea was to give the Commissioners that presentation before the awardee orientation. And I think at that time, Wendy does have a draft where she's putting together that information on where each of the projects is, and we could share it at that meeting.

4	that. That would be great. And it'd be interesting to
5	see where the deals get hung up for some reason. So
6	whether that's a process issue or a readiness issue, or,
7	you know, it'd be helpful to know that. Thank you. That
8	would be wonderful.
9	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yeah.
10	MR. MOBLEY: Okay. So -
11	COMMISSIONER EDWARDS: Oh, wait. I don't know
12	if Wendy is talking now to us.
13	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: She's muted.
14	MR. MOBLEY: Okay. So, thank you so much. I'm
15	here all night. So go ahead. Let me know if there's
16	anything else that you need. If a question comes up,
17	I'll be around.
18	INTERIM PRESIDENT TRUITT: Yes, thank you
19	again, John. We really appreciate all your hard work.
20	You know it's not easy.
21	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: (indiscernible).

1 COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Okay. So I think at 2 this time, we are opening up the forum to any community 3 questions or comments. Is that right, Stephanie? MS. ESTRADA: Yes. Hold on one second. 4 Okay. 5 I will probably open up the mic for a couple, but the 6 first question, Sharon Hunt, on page 12, how much of this 7 money has been disbursed? But I think she, John, she's talking in reference to the list of awardees and how much 8 9 they was awarded and how much actually went out the door. 10 MR. MOBLEY: Okay. Let's see, actual money out 11 the door, \$713,646 at the end of September. 12 included for -- I included it for -- I could do a breakup 13 of, like, whose money (indiscernible) included Charm City 14 Grant Trusts and expenses from consultants, but with 15 labor, everything in this point at the end of September, 16 \$713,646. I could round out. I could get specific cents 17 but I bumped it up that much. 18 MS. ESTRADA: Okay. To Silvia Gonzalez 19 (phonetic) -- this is just a statement. I think it would 20 be good to see the progress, not only in terms of 21 disbursement of funds, but also in terms of actual work

||being done (indiscernible).

MR. MOBLEY: I think that's right in line with what, with what has been said before. And I think that that's, a lot of that's going to come up with what is developed in and presented on the 25th. I, like I said, that's, you know, if I'm running on the building in that one, then I will know exactly how to get a response. But from what I understand of that, of the 25th meeting, that shouldn't (indiscernible).

MS. ESTRADA: Sharon Hunt, again.

(indiscernible), too. Question: very small amount of money -- why? And did you have any ideas on how to expedite this process?

MR. MOBLEY: Any ideas. A lot of process, pandemic, internal changes, external process and changes. A lot of the changes -- a lot of things that we can change, probably should be talking about, like specifically, I could talk to you offline about, or, you know. And that would probably shed a lot more light as to, like, what has happened so far. But there're more detail, or intricate details that could really be

1 | presented right here. But it makes a lot of sense.

MS. ESTRADA: Okay. I want to -- just let me - her last name's Lorraine Arikat. I'm sorry if I said
that wrong. Is there any discussion of expanding revenue
sources to the AHTF such as developer awarded with TIF
and also anchor institutions paying into the fund?

MR. MOBLEY: So I know that there's been some discussion about that. And there's been some effort by Commissioner Kin (phonetic) to (indiscernible), for like, external matching funds in order to supplement, like, what's been going on to leverage our funds. With the AHTF, as far as specifics, I mean, that, though I haven't been included in those discussions, but I know of at least, initially about, like additional leveraging and external partnership. And the specifics of them, I just -- our conversations haven't at best -- I haven't been included.

So I know that it's starting to happen. It has been discussed and are part of the plans going forward.

But as to what is sent, right now, I don't

(indiscernible).

MS. ESTRADA: Okay. Another question by

Lorraine Arikat: how can community members access

funding to rehab historical homes in (indiscernible) that

are currently owned by the City?

MR. MOBLEY: Well -- so these funds are meant to aid in housing and development and living conditions for people at and below a certain revenue of income level. So it's not necessarily a focus on rehabbing historic homes in any particular area. It's more meant to benefit a, I don't want to say target population, but a population above a certain threshold -- how about that -- that in order to help them with affordable housing. So I'm not sure that this is quite the fund that is meant to target what exactly that you're (indiscernible) that in a sense sounds like. But we're headed for -- but if it's helping to promote affordable housing for the people then I'm sure there's something that we could help them talk about.

MS. ESTRADA: I have a couple of people who have raised their hand. Peter Sabonis, your mic is unmuted. Did you have a question?

1 MR. SABONIS: No, I did not.

2 MS. ESTRADA: (indiscernible) Let me unmute her 3

Ms. Hunt, your mic is unmuted.

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MS. HUNT: Oh, yes. I have a further to statements I've made before. I know that you have mentioned that there are a lot of circumstances, the cold, and et cetera, about slowness of payment that this disbursal from the fund, but since you're on that, page 17 had a number of organizations listed, I'm not quite sure if I understand how so many different organizations have managed to all bog down in this payment process. Can you enlighten?

COMMISSIONER EDWARDS: Well, it's not just -it's thin contracts put together with all of the different organizations and all of them are in different phases and different places. So some of them have gotten further along and some are still being worked out. Another issue, I mean, a lot of the issues he spoke to were COVID and some of the internal things in the Department and the change over in the Department. some of those things are related to -- not related to

1 | each individual organization.

Additionally, some of the problems are that some of the programs don't have the other funding that lined up yet, so we're working through that too. So that it's just that each one has different things. It's not all the same but there's different issues with each one.

MS. HUNT: But who is dedicated to seeing that this money, which is still needed in the community, is actually getting out the door? I hear a lot of what isn't happening, but I don't hear a lot about what is being done to help organizations and people, because organizations represent people, to cut this process now from nine months or a year to something reasonable, like 60 to 90 days. Circumstances are going to always be there but I'm trying to understand if there is a acceptance of slowdown or a (indiscernible) and speed up.

COMMISSIONER EDWARDS: We're definitely working to speed up the process.

MS. HUNT: And that's good.

COMMISSIONER EDWARDS: Systems in place to make sure that things move quicker.

1	MS. HUNT: It does seem unfortunate that awards
2	that are made in April of a year have yet to be dispersed
3	in December of the same year.
4	MR. MOBLEY: Well, I can tell you, Ms. Hunt, it
5	would make me happy, most happy, to have the funds out on
6	the street. I understand anyone's frustration in this,
7	but I know our team's working as hard as we can in trying
8	to get it to speed up. So
9	MS. HUNT: Let me make one last statement.
10	MR. MOBLEY: Yes, ma'am.
11	MS. HUNT: There are people waiting at the end
12	of this tunnel. People who want housing, deserve
13	housing, need housing and have been historically, we
14	all know that, that line. We need to do better. And
15	with that, I'm done.
16	MR. MOBLEY: Thank you.
17	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: You're welcome.
18	MS. ESTRADA: Ms. Lorraine, I unmuted your mic.
19	I didn't want to mess up your last name. I hope I said
20	it right first. Did you have another question?
21	MS. ARIKAT: No, I don't.

MS. ESTRADA: Ty Hullinger. I hope I did not mess up your name but pronounce it for me. Your mic is unmuted --

MR. HULLINGER: Oh, thank you. It's Hullinger (indiscernible). I just really had a question. Don't read too much into this. I'm just observing from the cheap seats up in the balcony, but mention was made in the October revenues and something, and (indiscernible) that some people's faces would be smiling. Of course, it's hard to see faces through these platforms, but my question is, you know, it's been a question I've had before: do all the Commissioners get the same information, financial and otherwise, at the same time?

And relaying in to about the October

(indiscernible), can those revenues be stated tonight,

even if it's just like an estimate, it's not a final

number? It sounds like it was a really record month.

That would be good news to share across the City and we

know that increasing this Affordable Housing Trust Fund

is like -- in addition to -- what -- I just want to lift

up what Sharon just mentioned, but these funds need to be

getting out to the organizations that are doing the work.

But raising the fund also is such a critical thing

because we're still -- we know the need and end up

(indiscernible) spending amount of money is going to try

to meet the needs for permanence for affordable housing.

6 | It's very vast.

MR. MOBLEY: Sure.

MR. HULLINGER: Thank you.

MR. MOBLEY: Well, I mean, like I said, it's not finalized yet. It turns out we do try to make sure that all of the Commission members do get info at the same time. We do our best in order to make sure that information's disseminated around to the Commission as a whole. So we try. Sometimes there's other things that come up where someone might get left off for whatever reason, but we do our best and make sure everyone's included on the Commission. As far as the number for October, the revenue number that we have is, like at least showing, is a little over \$3.1 million for October.

Now, the thing is, we have to balance out against the expenditures that come across and that is,

you know, three times what we had here in this month, so, would you to look it up. And we're doing our best. I haven't had a lot of time to review it because the month actually just closed. So, I mean, like the financial statements, the financial books just closed. So that's why -- so the revenue seems extremely high -- a record month. Only one month has ever been even close to this month -- that month. And actually, it was May 2021, where there was about \$40,000 worth of difference. And May would've been the all-time record. So that's where we're at, what we expect to see coming up for next month. So that'll be the smile. MR. HULLINGER: Thank you. INTERIM PRESIDENT TRUITT: Can I just address one quick issue? The one question that you had, Ty, was, do we get the same information at the same time. And that answer is yes. We do all get the same information.

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COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: Do we have any more questions in the cue?

So, I for one, would like to go on the record and formally, hopefully, speaking for the Commission,

formally congratulate now, Official Commissioner Alice

Kennedy for her appointment as the Commissioner and

Director of DHCD. Hopefully, again speaking for the

Commission, we are very happy that she has been appointed

and have the best of hopes, and am quite sure that she

will flourish in the position.

And I would also like to speak to Ms. Sharon's comments. You know, Baltimore City has a legacy, unfortunately, of lack of transparency when it comes to city functioning and procedures. And I really -- I think that the frustration is magnified in the reality that we do -- the City does have -- has had issues with transparency as far as procedures and protocol. And I can only speak for myself in this regard. But as a Commissioner, really do take it as a responsibility to reflect and to vocalize and stand with the community in such frustrations. And, you know, in my role here, hopefully represent them in a satisfactory manner.

So I'm really hoping that we can do better with addressing these matters when it comes to being -- actually getting the money out the door. You know, we

have seen during these unprecedented times, when it comes to rental assistance, the fact that we haven't got, we've never had real infrastructure to address. Again, the legacy issue of evictions and lack of mechanisms to address house affordability that we've had to build infrastructure as we're in the midst of a crisis. And I think that's one of things that we're having to address now, the fact that we don't really have great infrastructure for getting these monies out the door in a manner that actually addresses the crisis of affordable housing that we're living in.

It is a crisis, and unfortunately, it's not being addressed as such. A lot of people don't have the luxury of waiting a year for the hope of more affordable housing. So I'm hoping that we can really start addressing the matter in an urgent way and really consider it. Consider the urgency of the matter because it really is a matter of life and death for a lot of people.

I'm seeing that we don't have any more questions in the cue. I'm going to turn it back over to

1	Commissioner Truitt.
2	INTERIM PRESIDENT TRUITT: Thank you so much.
3	If there is any other business that we didn't attend to
4	from the Commissioners? Okay. I don't believe so. So
5	in that case then, we are officially adjourned. Thank
6	you everyone for your wonderful comments and
7	participation. It's much appreciated. 7:53, we are now
8	formally adjourned.
9	COMMISSIONER GUTHRIE: All right. Have a great
10	weekend. We want to thank you so much.
